

After our second year of pandemic shutdowns, it seems that

our residents are ready for some normalcy in their lives. For many, that includes resuming travel or making plans to spend holidays with friends and family. While we are all aware (or should be) of appropriate COVID precautions, this might be a good time for reminders of basic tips to help keep us and our belongings safe this holiday season. So let's start with tips for those who will be away from home.

The first rule of thumb is to ensure your home always has the appearance of being occupied. This includes stopping newspaper deliveries and asking neighbors to remove any newspapers or flyers left on your property. Especially important is to reschedule package deliveries for a later date or ask a neighbor to hold them for you. A package left unattended makes easy prey for porch pirates.

One easy trick is to leave your television or radio on so it is just barely audible from your front porch. That way, a potential burglar will hear faint sounds and may mistakenly think your home is occupied. You may also consider purchasing timers for your home's indoor lights to give the appearance that you are home.

Holidays are also prime time for lighting up our homes and yards with decorations. Be sure to use extension cords rated for outdoor use, and avoid overloading plug strips as this can lead to a fire.

When making shopping trips, be sure and hide your purchases in the trunk of your car. If you drive an SUV or another vehicle without a trunk, it is best to keep purchases out of view by placing a dark-colored sheet or blanket over them. Making your shopping trips during daylight hours is recommended, but if that is not possible, it is best to park in well-lit areas and shop with a friend.

With just a little effort, we can reduce opportunities for crime by ensuring our garage doors are closed when we retire for the night, that our home's doors and windows are secure, that the exterior of our homes are well lit, and that the doors and windows of our cars are locked. Again, ensure that no valuables are visible in your unattended vehicle.

We are very fortunate that the City of Lincoln is consistently rated as one of the safest communities in our state, and Lincoln Hills is even safer! But safety works best when it is a team effort. If you see suspicious activity in your neighborhood, please report it to the Lincoln Police Department 916-645-4040 and Curator Security 916-771-7185. If we all do our part, we will enjoy a safe and enjoyable ho-ho-holiday season.

Finance Committee
A Busy Month
Fred Raach, Chair

During September, in addition to its regular review of

financial results and proposed projects, the Finance Committee completed its analysis of the 2021 Reserve Study and the proposed 2022 Budget, which determines dues, and made recommendations for the Board to approve both.

Also, in September, the Association net revenue increased \$26,000 to \$404,000 for the year, \$508,000 better than budget. This positive result comes from a combination of non-dues revenue \$241,000 higher and expenses \$267,000 lower than budget.

The chart shows where expenses are better (green) or worse (red) than budget by type of expense. Personnel Costs continue as the largest contributor to overall savings. Landscape Maintenance savings are primarily from the deferral of activities that may

still be done this year. Administrative Expenses overage increased by \$44,000 in September mainly due to unbudgeted expenditures for audit, other professional services, and human resource services. The increased cost of water continues as the major cause of the overage in Utilities.

Notable departmental expense items in September are an increase in the over-budget amount in the Administration Department, where all the unbudgeted items mentioned above are booked, and Food and Beverage net results that were better than budget.

The 2021 Reserve Study begins with a \$1.00 per month increase in the reserve contribution for 2022 and 2023 and increases in subsequent years to keep pace with inflation. It shows that the Association will have adequate funds to pay for all projected replacements every year throughout the 30 year study period and have a reserve fund of more than \$20 million in 2050 to help pay for future replacements.

The 2022 Budget assumes there will be no pandemic restrictions during the year and that residents will generally feel comfortable using

> the amenities and programs offered. It also incorporates known cost increases, including the minimum wage hike, higher costs for water and electricity, the increase in the reserve contribution, higher legal expenses, the addition of

one full-time position, and Operations having the costs for replacement of any item no longer in reserves (computers and related equipment and any item costing less than \$2,000). The positive net revenue carryover from 2020 offsets these increases and the Committee recommended continuing the \$133 monthly dues amount.

Architectural Review Committee Sharing Leadership Richard Bostdorff, Co-Chair

Yes, there is a new face appearing in this column. I am Richard

Bostdorff, recently appointed co-chair with Carole Dummett to lead the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) and provide support to the community. Carole has a wealth of experience, both leading the ARC and in the community. I look forward to sharing the committee leadership and learning from her back-

ground. I am a retired corporate executive and led a development company, as it developed a community similar to this great one in Reno. So, I do have some experience in planned communities and HOA processes. Over a year ago, after looking at several other



communities, we decided to relocate here. The look and feel of Lincoln Hills, as well as the active lifestyle, and great residents, made it an easy choice for us.

As new residents, we needed to add fencing, re-landscape the rear yard, and put in solar. As we worked through the ARC applications, we realized several things. First, the Design Guidelines are very complete and are regularly updated as options and tastes change. Second, the ARC checklists, while requiring some work, do help ensure you have a successful project that is consistent with the look and feel of the community. It is that look that attracted many of you to the community also. I joined the ARC believing that my experience would be helpful, and I have a desire to help other residents complete their projects within the guidelines as smoothly as possible.

As you submit an ARC application, please do

the following:

- 1) Read the related Design Guidelines to fully understand what is required and approved.
- 2) Ensure you fill in all the information on the checklists (which are excellent guides), and remember to sign and date them.
- 3) Double check that you have a list of plants, and the location of the plants, on a landscape plan. Check

the approved plant lists, and make sure you comply with the required setbacks.

These are the areas that most often cause us to mark an application incomplete. If you have a question, feel free to contact Jessie Krost, Community Standards Coordinator, at

Jessie.Krost@sclhca.com for assistance.

Fall is upon us, and this is an excellent time to upgrade your landscaping or replace plants that need replacing. Replacing a plant with a new one (assuming it is on the approved plant list) does not require an ARC application.

Another fall item, as the winds build and the threat of power outages loom, is the installation of generators and solar systems. Again, please read the Design Guidelines, carefully complete the checklist, and make sure you have all the required documentation.

We are expecting to return to open ARC meetings in November so we can assist you with applications and answer questions. There are openings on the ARC, and I would encourage you to apply. It is a great way to give back to Lincoln Hills.

Compliance Committee Improving Communications *David Mateer, Chair*

When a matter comes up for

Community Standards to handle, cordial, clear, and effective communication is essential. There is a set of steps the Association uses to communicate with our members for all potential violations. The majority of communications for potential violations are letters from Community Standards. This is intended to provide a written and clear understanding of the potential problem and required action.

To assist with uniform communications, Community Standards established template letters

for communicating with our members. The Compliance Committee has undertaken a review of the templates used to see if we can enhance the letters and their effectiveness for our community. The committee has already reviewed five of the letter templates used and presented suggested changes to our Executive Director.

We are currently working on revising the First Notice and Second Notice letters. These cover the vast majority of all communication.

These letters are cri-

tical as they provide the initial contact and information regarding the potential violation. We have solicited input from both committee members and the community as a whole. Samples of the current templates are in the Library/Forms/Community Standards section on the Resident Website. You may review these samples and offer suggestions via our committee email address, Compliance. Committee@sclhca.com.

We are also researching letters used by other associations to see how they accomplish this important communication. Several areas and ideas of improvement have already been discussed. We hope to be able to finalize our suggestions prior to the end of the year. Some of the content of the letters is needed to fulfill legal requirements, as is some of the timing. However, we have substantial flexibility to ensure they are helpful, clear, and complete for everyone.

The current content of the letters is created by Association management and staff. The committee

is working to provide suggestions on how we can improve and serve you, our members better. As with almost everything, these changes are part of the next step of continual improvement. We hope to be able to incorporate these suggestions early in 2022.

In early 2022, we will also begin to review the content of the letters for specific common problems to ensure they clearly describe both the current

condition and any necessary corrective action. In some cases, we may develop additional documents to provide further helpful information.

Should you receive a letter and be unsure why, what it means, or what to do, the Community Standards department is available to assist you and should be your first point of contact. Their contact information is in the letters or email them at Community.Standards@sclhca.com.

The Properties Committee has seven members who dedicate their

time generously to support our community. It makes a difference in the lives of others and our lives, too. We work as a team where our specialized skills and interests are used to their full advantage, and our responsibilities are shared among the team. With our Board liaisons, Jack Harris and Craig Fraser, Finance Committee liaison, Chuck Cunningham and Facilities & Maintenance Manager Erik Rosales, we know when we work together, we achieve more.

This month we welcome Rich Lujan. Rich was an engineer and in addition is knowledgeable about software programming and management. He made a wonderful video for our New Resident Orientation. In Rich's words, "I was pleased to make a video that stated why I enjoy living in Lincoln Hills." In the twelve-

minute and twenty-one-second video, Rich speaks about coming through our entrance for the first time, viewing the waterfalls, and seeing a beautiful and active community. He knew immediately that this would be the best place to spend his retirement years. Rich found the right community and the right committee to join to secure his future.

When a project request form is submitted to the Properties Committee, it can be handled three different ways. We vote to approve the project, we vote to deny the project, or it goes to a task force for further review. When a project is approved, it goes to the Finance Committee and then to our Board of Directors for final approval. The finalization of a project is a source of pride for our Properties Committee. It means that everyone worked hard

to reach a positive outcome.

Once large projects are underway, we monitor progress during construction. Here is a partial list of projects, picking and choosing among many. Work is completed on the Blue Heron Bridge, Kilaga fence is repaired and painted, mulch replacement is underway, sidewalk grinding and repairs are scheduled as needed, concrete wood fencing is ongoing, post and cable fencing is in progress.

The Orchard Creek and Kilaga Springs parking lots will have crack repairs, resealing, and restriping as





Sometimes we have emergency repairs and replacements that go directly to the Executive Director. Examples of emergency spending would be for a loss of Association property, interruption of services to the residents, or personal injury to any individual. For additional information, go to our Resident Website. You can view our prior committee meeting minutes, inspection reports, and videos of previous meetings. Because our workload has increased in the last few years, we are expanding our committee to nine members. At our previous meeting, we had over 16 projects that were either proposed, in the works, or awaiting bids, permits, materials, or contractors. The Board has recently tasked the CCRC with a project that is a bit daunting, The Community Outreach Project. They have requested that the "CCRC develop an expanded concept of community involvement in the selection and prioritization of capital projects in cooperation with the Executive Director." It is very important to note that the CCRC is not the decision-maker with regard to any projects, it provides the framework for obtaining input and facilitates gathering that input. Decisions on priorities and spending will be made by the appropriate individuals/committees.

The CCRC will present findings and recommendations based on resident feedback on how residents would like outreach from the HOA to obtain input. Still, the ever-present question is how to gather that feedback.

Many of the readers of this article are the ones who regularly attend Board meetings, committee meetings, and workshops, but how do we engage with households who do not? There will always be residents who prefer not to weigh in, but if we are to consider the opinions of all residents, we need to make our best

effort to reach out to everyone.

At the recent CCRC meeting, we discussed a number of ideas that could possibly gather the broadest input possible. Ideas ranged from the simplest to more complex undertakings, but each one has the potential to inspire someone to participate. We will look to establish a process that supports decision-making by the Finance and Properties Committees as well as by the Executive Director and Board.

Sample ideas that are possible include focus groups where we issue personal invitations to a random cross section of residents, village meetings or coffee talks, flash surveys, workshops, club outreach, information tables at the lodges, podcasts, and even something as simple as directing residents to the suggestion box at the Orchard Creek Lodge (and yes, there is one).

This is a big undertaking, and we know we will never reach everyone, but we are going to try to increase the scope of our reach so that as many residents as possible can weigh in. Chef's Recipe of the Month:



Beer and Bourbon Fondue Recipe Ingredients

- 2 garlic cloves
- 1/2 cup Belgian beer (such as Duvel or Chimay)
- 2 cups dry white wine, (keep ½ cup in reserve)
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 pound Gruyère or Traditional Swiss Cheese, coarsely grated
- 1 pound Babybel cheese, grated
- 2-3 tablespoons bourbon (George Dickel is a preference of mine)
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- Kosher salt to taste

Instructions

- Evenly grate Gruyere and Baybel cheeses. Yes, Babybel (the wax rind cheese). This well help evenly melt, as well as emulsify your fondue's ingredients.
- Using a Microplane, finely grate garlic directly into the saucepan over medium heat; add beer and 1 1/2 cups wine and bring to a boil over medium heat.
- Whisk cornstarch and remaining 1/2 cup wine in a small bowl until no lumps remain, then whisk into liquid in saucepan. Bring to a boil, whisking constantly, then reduce heat so mixture is at a very low simmer.
- Very slow and gradually, add Gruyère and Babybel, whisking until smooth (fully incorporate each batch of cheese before adding more).
- Whisk bourbon and baking soda in a small bowl to combine, then whisk into fondue, followed by lemon juice.
- Season with salt. Transfer to a fondue pot and serve with bread, ham, salami, pickles, and crudités for dipping.
- Cut (1-inch pieces) country-style bread, preferably day-old (for serving).

Monument Center Panel -The Price Of Freedom Is Never Free

We enjoy our freedoms today because of the sacrifice of others.

More than 41 million Americans have served in the military from the Revolutionary War through the present. Today, there are less than 18 million veterans, average age 65 years, with Vietnam vets averaging 71 and WW II vets averaging 93 years.

Memorial Day 2021 saw the dedication of the Placer County Veterans Monument, located in McBean Park.

Five years in the planning, fundraising, and most recently construction, the project was a labor of love for those involved, and it's now the community's to embrace. The Monument was built entirely with business and individual donations. Individual plaques – purchased to honor any living or deceased veteran from a military branch no matter where they live or lived – are (or will be) inserted into one of the 12 panels of the Monument. Most Lincoln Hills residents came of age during the Vietnam War era. The next oldest cohort is from the Korean conflict period. We have, also, a few residents from what Tom Brokaw termed, *The Greatest Generation*. They lived through tremendous cataclysms in our nation's history. This column could talk about any of our veteran's services to our

nation, but today we will talk about...

The Greatest Generation

The veterans of World War II once numbered 16 million men and women. Today, they number less than 100,000, with their ranks rapidly declining. They served in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Army Air Corps, and Merchant Marines. Most all entered their service as young people; they grew up quickly.

Lincoln Hills is home to seven (identified, plus likely more) World War II veterans:

- Virgil Richardson (103 years old) U.S. Army, Pacific Theater Construction Battalion.
- Charlie McCarty (95) U.S. Navy Gunners Mate on the SS Whirlwind (Pacific Theater).
- Dave Morgan (94) Army Air Corps (Pacific Theater)
- Bob Snook (93) U.S. Army (Japan Occupation)
- Lee Belshin (94) U.S. Navy (stateside)
- Ted Martinson (94) Pacific Theater
- William (Bill) McCarrel (96) U.S. Marine Corps (Pacific Theater)

Brokaw summed it up best: "They came of age during the Great Depression and the Second World War and went on to build modern America – men and women whose everyday lives of duty, honor, achievement, and courage gave us the world we have today."

The magic begins at a table outside Donna's front door, where club members drop off their creations. Cards are organized according to category: Birthday, Thinking of You, and recently-added Christmas and Holiday. A sticker is placed inside each card, denoting its origin: "Created by the Paper Arts Club, Sun City Lincoln Hills."

Donna delivers the prepared batches of cards with a note attached to each facility. Unfortunately, because of COVID-19, she's not been able to meet or speak with residents.

All those participating agree that it's a special opportunity to help out and give back. They believe that there is power in the handmade greeting card – a way to demonstrate to those who are lonely or living away from their homes that someone is thinking of them.

Placer County Food Bank helping wildfire victims

With pumpkin pie-in-the-sky hopes, our Association departments brought their Thanksgiving Service Projects to the table for the seventh straight year—and served up a four-course meal. Sparked by the skills, dedication, and philanthropic fortitude of our staff, each department sponsored a separate regional non-profit organization. Through advertisements, flyers, and word of mouth, they solicited contributions to give back to the greater Lincoln

area—and residents gobbled up the idea to make the campaign a resounding success.

The Communications Department chose the Placer County Food Bank because it wanted to find an organization that services the Lincoln Area and would also help the people affected by the wildfires. They initially set a goal of \$2,500. But once the residents joined forces with the staff, donations exceeded \$8,300.

The Wellfit Department adopted the Phoenix High School project. Deborah McIlvain explained, "a resident introduced us to the principal, and we just fell in love with the school and what they are doing for kids that get a little lost or just need a little more assistance." The Wellfit Team dropped off eight large boxes of supplies and over \$2,000 in gift cards and monetary donations.

The Lifestyle Department led

the drive for The Gathering Inn. Donation bins, set up in both lodges, overflowed when residents brought in essential personal and hygiene products, which would be distributed to the Placer County homeless.

Lighthouse Counseling was the choice of the Administration Department—guiding the way for donations used to provide counseling, case management, and educational classes to individuals and families that need extra help during difficult times.

Theresa Renken, *Compass* Editor, who spearheaded the Communications Department campaign, summed up the reason for the projects' success. "The real secret is the true giving nature of this community. I think many of the residents have been in situations in their lives where they needed a helping hand, and they genuinely want to give back. We simply provided them the opportunity, and thankfully they stepped up at an overwhelming level."

Numerous clubs and groups regularly hold their own fundraising efforts. Still, when it came to supporting the service projects, generous residents did not hesitate in teaming with our compassionate staff. Regardless if it is food for the hungry, school supplies for needy students, fresh essentials for the homeless, or counseling for the distressed, the pilgrims of Lincoln Hills are always blazing the trail so that local charities may flower.





The Science Behind Giving Back: "Helpers High"

"We make a living by what we get. We make a life by what we give." (Sir Winston Churchill). Giving is good for your physical and mental health. Giving creates for the giver a purpose in life. Giving has been defined as providing love or other emotional support. Giving means caring about someone or something outside yourself.



You do not need a doctor to tell you that giving feels good, but there is actually some scientific research behind this "helpers high." Mitchell Popovetsky, MD, at Rush University Medical Center has demonstrated through MRI technology that giving stimulates the reward and pleasure part of the brain the same way food, drugs, and sex do. This leads to greater self-esteem, life satisfaction,

and purpose, which, in turn, improves your health and quality of life and even increases your chances for a longer life.

The famous Cleveland Clinic published an article on 2020 in which they listed and discussed the health benefits of giving:

- Lower blood pressure
- Increased self-esteem
- Less depression
- Lower stress level
- Longer life

Longer life is worth taking a look at. For example, older people who volunteered for two or more organizations were found to have a 44 percent less likelihood of dying over a five-year period than non-volunteers in a 1999 study out of UC Berkeley (Doug Oman). Similar results were reported in a 2003 study out of the University of Michigan. (Stephanie Brown).

While giving can provide a deep sense of meaning for older people, it is possible that giving can become too much. Research has shown that the underlying reason for giving makes a difference. It is no surprise



that it is healthier to offer to help others rather than do it to benefit yourself. Life circumstances can thrust some into the role of being a caregiver for a loved one. Potentially this may lead to adverse health and well-being risks for the caregiver whereby they are not taking time for self-care. Therefore, it is important to strike a happy balance.

Physiologically, giving for the benefit of others activates the "feel good" chemicals in the brain and contributes to one's sense of happiness. Giving can become addictive. So feed this good addiction, and reward yourself with a "helpers high" by finding ways to meaningfully give of your time and talents.
